Swiss artist Shahryar Nashat is part of the recent diaspora of young artists finding an inspiration and a new public in Los Angeles — pushing California's light and space art toward intimate, cosmetic, and technological abstraction.

Maurizio Cattelan and Marta Papini: How long have you been living in LA?

Shahryar Nashat: Three years.

MC and MP: *Is there a red zone in the city* — *a place you wouldn't visit unless forced to?*

SN: No. I like to discover.

MC and **MP**: What do you think is missing in art?

SN: People who genuinely care about art.

MC and MP: What's the most fundamental aspect of an artwork, from your point of view?

SN: To be critical, humorous, and self-deprecating at the same time.

MC and MP: *Do you think art can be a way to overcome fear and face the unknown?*

SN: For the artist, certainly. For the audience, I don't think so.

MC and **MP**: Are we in a condition of constant fear or constant indifference?

SN: Yes, and it's quite disillusioning.

MC and **MP**: *Do you think that art can play the role of a forerunner?*

SN: Always has, always will.

MC and MP: If the avant-garde is not in museums or galleries, where is it today?

SN: In the zeroes and the ones.

MC and **MP**: *Is mediocrity a deadly sin for an artist?*

SN: Definitely.

MC and MP: Is art about entertainment?

SN: For mediocre artists, maybe.

MC and **MP**: What is the worst compliment you've received for your work?

SN: Someone told me that he was really interested in contemporary artists from the Middle East.

MC and MP: The best criticism?

SN: Being compared to a legendary dead artist.

MC and **MP**: *Are you still able to waste your time?*

SN: It's the only way to make work.

MC and MP: What did you learn from the hardest period in your life?

SN: Don't expect anything.

MC and **MP**: Have you already made your masterpiece?

SN: I feel another one coming on.

MC and MP: Do you ever think about the audience's reactions when you're planning a new

work?

SN: I'm my toughest audience.

MC and MP: Can you imagine a world without art?

SN: Of course.

MC and MP: How do you think your career will end?

SN: With death.

MC and **MP**: How would you like your life to end?

SN: I often think about it, and I cannot decide.
